
Black Software: The Internet and Racial Justice

This book traces how Black people have historically used the internet for organizing, social movements, and digital justice, which overlaps significantly with how social media has become a platform for entrepreneurship, activism, and culture.



Ghost in the Criminal Justice Machine: Reform, White Supremacy, and an Abolitionist Future

The book argues that white supremacy is the underlying cause of mass incarceration and that reform efforts are insufficient to address the problem. DeWeaver combines personal narrative with social commentary to critique the racial logic of the criminal justice system.



Blackballed: The Black Vote and US Democracy

In this combination of memoir, historical narrative, and contemporary political and social analysis, he investigates the struggle for black voting rights from Reconstruction through the civil rights movement to Barack Obama's two presidential campaigns.




Double Negative

Gates demonstrates how reality shows such as Basketball Wives, comedians like Katt Williams, and movies like Coming to America play on "negative" images to take up questions of assimilation and upward mobility, provide a respite from the demands of respectability, and explore subversive ideas. By using negativity as a framework to illustrate these texts' social and political work as they reverberate across black culture, Gates opens up new lines of inquiry for black cultural studies.

Citizen of the Year Award

A Chicago native born at the crossroads of working-class life, Black identity, and womanhood, **Shay Stewart-Bouley** has spent her career weaving these intersecting experiences into both her personal life and professional work. Initially working directly with marginalized groups, she later stepped into leadership roles in non-profit administration.

In the early 2000s, Shay relocated from Chicago to Maine. Living as a Black woman in one of the nation's least diverse states sharpened her voice and commitment to addressing race, justice, and equity. What began as reflections on daily life evolved into a powerful public platform: **Black Girl in Maine Media (BGIM)**. Through her widely read blog, Shay has challenged readers to confront issues of systemic racism, white supremacy, and privilege while also sharing her lived experiences as a Black middle-aged woman navigating predominantly white communities.

Her writing has been recognized nationally, published in anthologies, and sustained through more than a decade of monthly columns for the *Portland Phoenix* under the title "Diverse-City." Beyond the written word, Shay has become a sought-after public voice. In 2016, she delivered a memorable TEDx talk, "**Inequity, Injustice... Infection**," which shared her insights into the structural realities of modern struggles.

Since 2014, Shay has served as the Executive Director of Community Change Inc. (CCI), one of the nation's oldest organizations committed to challenging structural racism.

For her steadfast dedication, her courage to speak truth in difficult spaces, and her ability to inspire collective action, we are honored to name Shay Stewart-Bouley the 2025 BHTNH Citizen of the Year.



Boggis was named in 2015 by the New Hampshire Humanities Council as one of the 40 most influential New Hampshireites who have vastly enriched human understanding and whose original works and passion for excellence have put New Hampshire on the cultural map.



Dr. Lowell "Chris" Matthews is an associate professor of Global Business and Leadership at Southern New Hampshire University (SNHU). At SNHU he has developed courses on white privilege, workplace diversity, and gender equity. His areas of expertise include leadership, human resources, and strategic management. He volunteers with Big Brothers Big Sisters of New Hampshire, City Year, and the Granite YMCA. He has served as chair of the board for DreamCatchers NH.



Linda Harriott-Gathright has served as NH State Representative for Hillsborough County District 10 since 2018, as well as a previous term from 2012-2014. Award-winning writer **Ebony JJ Curry's** extensive background in journalism is underscored by her dedication to telling impactful stories that spotlight the advancement of the Black community through politics, economic development, community engagement, and social justice.



Cheyney McKnight is an African American historical interpreter and educator, known for her interpretation company and online handle **Not Your Momma's History**. She uses her clothing and primary sources to make connections between past and present events through performance art pieces.



Antonio Saunders is an entrepreneur and storyteller who created the **HFD Model (Humanity, Freedom, and Dreams)**, a framework that shifts the paradigm from simply fighting injustice to proactively building social progress. He is also the founder of **Kriseles**, a company that partners with CEOs and executives to cultivate future-ready organizations.



Ronelle Tshiela is a litigation fellow with the **Lawyering Project**, where she works to challenge laws nationwide that restrict or undermine reproductive health, rights, and justice. While still in high school, she co-founded Black Lives Matter New Hampshire, becoming one of the youngest voices for racial justice in the state.



Shay Stewart-Bouley is the executive director of Community Change Inc., a Boston-based anti-racism organization. She is the creator of the award-winning site, **Black Girl in Maine**, where she blogs on matters of race and aging. Her work has been featured in a number of national publications and anthologies, including **Yes Magazine** and **The Huffington Post**.



Three-time NAACP Image Award Nominee **Lynae Vanee** is a profoundly multifaceted talent, shining as a poet, producer, director, and starring personality. Hailing from Atlanta, Georgia, Lynae's academic journey is as impressive as her digital presence. Holding a degree from Spelman College and a Master's Degree in African American Studies from Boston University, Lynae's influence extends to traditional media as well, notably as the host of *Revolt's "The People's Brief."* In this role, she brings her signature insightful commentary and sharp analysis to a broader audience, breaking down complex issues into understandable and engaging segments, further cementing her reputation as a vital voice in contemporary discourse. For the past five years, Lynae has meticulously crafted her brand around the powerful mantra, "keeping it Black but keeping it brief." This philosophy guides her in delivering critical context on today's most pressing issues in a manner that is both succinct and highly stylized. As a creator, Lynae has also partnered with numerous brands, leveraging her authentic voice to connect with diverse audiences.



A veteran television host, social media influencer, and author, **Shannon LaNier** is currently a television news anchor/host with News 12. He hosts two shows, "Road Trip" and "Be Well." Previously, you may have seen Shannon anchoring on the nationally syndicated network BNC (Black News Channel), or CW39's morning show in Houston, TX. Before that, he was in NYC hosting the star-studded global culture and entertainment series "Arise Entertainment 360," for BET, and was a correspondent/Sr. Producer on *Black Enterprise Magazine's* nationally-syndicated shows: "Black Enterprise Business Report" and "Our World With Black Enterprise."



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
